This course introduces the student to the sound system and grammatical structure of the French language. The focus is on developing skills in the areas of aural comprehension, speaking, reading, and writing. By the end of the semester, the student has a basic understanding of grammar, including word formation, verb conjugations, idiomatic expressions, and cognates. This course also discusses various cultural aspects of the French-speaking world. Four hours of lecture per week. This course is for students who have taken less than four years of French, who scored less than 80 on the New York State Regents French Exam, or who took high school French more than five years ago. Fluent speakers of French may enroll only with the permission of the instructor. Heritage speakers of French may enroll in French I in cases of limited proficiency.
