**APA IN-TEXT CITATIONS (PARENTHETICAL CITATIONS) – General Format: (Last name, Year, p. #).**

(Patchett, 2016, p. 47)	Author name and page number available
(Eschholz & Rosa, 2011, p. 7)	Two authors and page number available
(Frye, 2016)	Author available, but no page number because it is a web document
("Writing Center Handouts," n.d.)	Web page with no author/page numbers, so use article title (shortened if needed) in quotes; if no date, insert "n.d." to indicate no date
(Swasy, 2016, p. 652)	Scholarly article in online database; original print page number available
